



KEYNOTE SPEAKER LINDA PUMPHREY

RED AND WHITE QUILTS

AUGUST 17

The August 17 guild meeting program will be all about red and white quilts. Nationally recognized expert Linda Pumphrey will speak about the history and characteristics of these iconic quilts, and treat us to a show of antique red and white pieces from her personal collection and those of her own making.

Linda has had a life-long passion for quilts, old and new. Her love for quilting came to her from her mother and grandmother. In fact there have been quilters in her family for at least five generations...perhaps it is in her DNA? She started collecting quilts in the mid-1990's, focusing on those involving very tiny pieces, and then red and white quilts.

Linda is a quilt designer, a quilt maker, and has won international awards for her hand quilting. Furthermore she is the author of two books:

Mountain Mist Historical Quilts and Red & White Quilting. She's also been so fortunate as to have been able to mix business with her quilting pleasure, with a career spanning more than 30 years in the quilting industry working as a marketing or account executive for AccuQuilt and for Fibrix, LLC (the maker of Mountain Mist batting).

In 2018, Linda was a guest with Alex Anderson on <u>The Quilt Show</u>, (Show #2212) in a program focusing on her book Red & White Quilting.






Linda is also an active member with several quilting non-profits. She currently serves on the board for the International Quilt Museum, University of Nebraska, Lincoln, NE, and is past president of the Quilt Alliance board. She currently serves as Assistant Treasure of her local guild, Calico Cut-Ups.

You will have a chance to purchase Linda's books at the guild meeting or may be purchased online <u>HERE</u>. Both books feature quilt history associated with the specific topic, and also provide block designs and layout ideas to make your own quilts. The book Red & White Quilting offers basic quilting and finishing techniques, as well as tips on two-color quilt-making providing a comprehensive guide to every aspect of this traditional design approach. Additionally, it discusses the history of "Turkey red" fabric, provides an inspirational photogallery of historic red-and-white quilts, plus offers 14 designs for finished red and white quilts.

I wonder if it is humanly possible to use the words 'quilt' or 'quilting' more times in a short statement.

A Message from our Schoolhouse Chair

This will be my fourth year of chairing the Schoolhouse committee. One reason that volunteering with Schoolhouse appeals to me is that I am a very eclectic quilter and am always interested in learning new quilting techniques myself! It has certainly been an exciting challenge to plan a careful variety of classes each year that will capture the interest of guild members. In the process, I have the chance to learn a bit about the techniques, as well as getting to know my fellow guild members better as I work with them as either teachers or students!





Perhaps my favorite part of the Schoolhouse chair position involves brainstorming potential class topics; reaching out to fellow Schoolhouse committee members for suggestions; and finally putting together a list of teachers (usually volunteers from the guild membership) for the year's lineup of classes. Once a class is scheduled, I try to stay in close contact with teachers to help guide them as needed through the process of planning their classes and to make them aware of upcoming deadlines for things like putting together a class description to be listed on the guild website and in our BBQ newsletter. As often as possible, I attend guild meetings (asking another committee volunteer when I cannot attend) to "man" the Schoolhouse table and answer questions about upcoming classes and help with class registrations. Some tracking of registrations takes place at home as well. I also often act as a teacher's aide during Schoolhouse classes to help things run as smoothly as possible . . . although sometimes teachers are able to provide their own helpers, or a committee volunteer steps into the aide position for a class that interests them.

The 2024 guild year list of Schoolhouse classes is still under construction, and you are most welcome to contact me if you have a suggestion for a class that you would love to teach (or take!) Suggestions are then evaluated for viability and probable interest level. Ones that do not get scheduled right away are often kept under consideration for future years.

Schoolhouse started out as a way to keep past guild presidents actively involved in the guild, allowing them to share their favorite quilting techniques and expertise with their fellow guild members. Although several past guild presidents are still part of the Schoolhouse committee, this is no longer a requirement, and any guild member is welcome to join the Schoolhouse committee or volunteer to teach a class. Volunteers who are willing to step in to help supervise the Schoolhouse table at guild meetings or act as teacher aides are much appreciated, as well!

2024 will be my final year to serve as Schoolhouse chair. If this position interests you, now is the perfect time to start serving as a Schoolhouse volunteer so that you will have a very good feel for how the program works and be able to start developing your own ideas for its direction by the time you step into the chair position for 2025!






Basically, we 1) read a book, 2) discuss the book, 3) plan some fun activities, and 4) share our quilt creations.

Small Group Stitchin' Sisters By Debbie Haumesser





Stitchin' Sisters (of Nampa) continues to meet on the first & third Friday of each month in nearby Caldwell for a full day of sewing and socializing. The group started in August 2018 when then-president Sharon Culley sent an "are you interested in forming a small group?" email to BBQ members living in Canyon County. About 15 people first started meeting in a small study room in the Nampa Public Library, with the initial focus on socializing and sharing, including "Show & Tell." The group now embraces both members and non-members of the Boise Basin Quilters Guild.

Over time, membership increased and waned, and the group eventually outgrew the meeting space in the Library. They also wanted to have sew days. After living life as gypsies, near the end of 2021 the group found a permanent meeting place in a church Fellowship Hall in Caldwell, about 8 miles from the Nampa Public Library.

In May 2021 (COVID), meetings were held outdoors at Mallard Park, where members had to hang on tight to blocks and quilts as the wind blew and temperatures dropped. Needless to say, there was no sewing in the park shelters. This led to a discussion about taking on some community outreach projects that could be made at home. Upon learning that foster children in Canyon County are an under-served community, members of Stitchin' Sisters have now made more than 150 quilts for these children, using donated fabrics (from outside sources as well as from personal stashes), and utilizing the generosity of a few members with longarm machines who have donated their time to quilting the tops. One member does almost all the bindings and the final stop is at a member's home for washing before the quilts are donated. In November 2021, the group received a \$500 "Pay It Forward" award from KBOI/News 2 and Mountain America Credit Union. Those funds were used to purchase backing and batting. In addition to charitable outreach, the group's focus remains "socializing and sharing" and continues to make quilts for personal use. Many are participating in the Small Group Challenge for the upcoming Quilt Show. We break for lunch and "fellowship around food" mid-day, which is also personal sharing time, group discussion, and Show & Tell. Sometimes around a holiday the group will enjoy a carry-in "potluck" luncheon. May 5 was "Taco de Sew Day" with a carry-in taco luncheon; and July 7 was a "Belated 4th of July Picnic" day.

There is a private Facebook page with free patterns in the Files, lots of photos, and information about upcoming meetings, etc. The page has 85 followers with many members posting photos and comments. In addition, email notifications are also sent to members to remind them of meeting dates and topics. Meeting attendance usually ranges from 10 to 15 participants, and free-will donations are used to cover the cost of the room for the day.

This group has become a true sisterhood where members share freely, everyone is welcome regardless of ability, and as true sisters would –any "stitchin' brothers" who might like to take a chance on coming into a room full of enthusiastic quilting sisters would be warmly received!

Notably, Stitchin' Sisters was asked to make the 2023 Gems of Idaho Raffle Quilt for the Boise Basin Quilt Show. The quilt features multiple techniques made in quilt construction, and each block represents something notable about the State of Idaho. It is dedicated to the Guild's 40-year presence in the Treasure Valley for its "Ruby Jubilee."

Enterprising group of women create a legacy of creativity, service, and companionship.

Two people, one, an avid embroidery person,
Linda Dixon and Jo Inzer Smith, a quilter who
recently moved here from California met at a
wonderful stitchery shop in Belgravia in downtown
Boise (5th and Main - SW corner). Linda wanted to
start a chapter of the Embroiderers Guild of America
and Jo wanted to belong to a quilt guild like she
belonged to in Southern CA. Jo was already attending
national quilt conferences. Linda said, "Jo if you help
me start an Embroidery Guild, I will then help you
start a quilt guild."

About a year later, in 1979, with IGA underway, I was taking a beginning quilting class from Jacque

Riddlemoser at her home. At the time we did not have a quilt shop in Boise, but very nice locally owned fabric stores. I had recently sold The Window Box, my plant and macrame shop in Meridian, and home and moved to Boise's North End into a 90+ year old house to focus on the gift shop opened a year prior in Old Boise, Mother Hubbards Cupboard. Also, my husband and I had purchased a brass bed which seemed to cry for a quilt. I wanted one, but could I live long enough to complete it? At one of my last classes with Jacque, she announced she was soon attending a gathering of quilt enthusiasts in the Boise Highlands and wondered if

anyone in class would like to attend. I thought it was so close to where I lived I should attend and Jacque volunteered to pick me up, thus we went.

At that meeting it was determined that a quilt guild would form as a part of Embroiderers of America (EGA), thus avoiding all the paperwork associated with starting a separate organization. We paid our membership fees to EGA and \$7.00 of the \$12.00 went to the National organization. Our quilt group of about 16 met in our homes and became known as Ouilt Gems. Jo Inzer Smith and Jacque Riddlemoser were the most knowledgeable quilters and assigned us all to research and present programs at our monthly gatherings on the 3rd Tuesdays. I remember being assigned batting... about which I had no idea there was so much to know and consider. It was all a bit intimidating, especially the idea I would ever make a full sized hand pieced, hand quilted quilt. At that time (late 70's), as quilter's the only thing we used our sewing machines for was to sew the quilt together and add the first step of the binding. Because the walking foot had not yet been invented, even machine sewing the binding was time-consuming. We had to baste it first or it would ripple ... heaven forbid.

I joined the group because, one, they were a fun group of women to spend time with and they were going to make a quilt to raffle, raising money to have a quilt show. I was especially attracted to the

idea of making a raffle quilt. If I could actually see a quilt go together to completion and, then, perhaps I would have the confidence to attack one on my own. As time progressed, I could see, even more than making a quilt, how with a quilt show we could raise awareness in our community to the many values of a quilt, hoping they would then be treasures to be inherited, rather than sold at garage sales. That became important to all of us.

It was not enough for Jo Inzer. In January of 1981, I was one of a group of 6 women invited to lunch at Jo Inzer's house to discuss ways we might all have quilts

finished in time for our first show. We soon added an 8th member! By the time lunch was over, a plan had been hatched to that end. Every two weeks, we made blocks for one of us which got us going on our quilt.

Once the quilt top was ready, we would gather at a home, put it on a frame, return 2-3 more times to make some progress and, within the year, we all had quilts at home to work on both on our own and individually. We made our goal of all having finished quilts for the 1983 quilt show and I had a quilt for the brass bed!

Jo Inzer's young and very active twin boys called us "Mom's Quilters" and it stuck. Our small group has lost and added new members and overall doesn't quilt as much or the same as it once did 40+ years ago. But, as of March, 2023, there are 11 of us meeting once each month on First Thursday, sharing our lives and projects. Over the years our small group has lost and added new members. We don't quilt the same as we did 40+ years ago, but we still meet sharing our lives and projects.

Following the Spring of 1983 EGA/Quilt Gems Quilt show, the quilt group broke away and started Boise Basin Quilters. The first order of business was again, to make a quilt and raffle it off in order to raise funds for a quilt show. Boise Basin Quilters' first quilt show was "Pieces Lives: Quilts 1986".

A big part of our charter was to bring awareness of quilting to the Treasure Valley. We showed quilts in many public places including the Capitol Building and invited nationally known quilters to Boise to teach and lecture and promoted those lectures to the public. We made quilts to commemorate the major events, such as the National Governors Conference when held in Boise. And, we held Ada County documentation days followed by a show in 1990 featuring the many special quilts that were uncovered in the process. Those files are now housed at the Idaho State Historical Society.
