

Schoolhouse News

Registration is now open for the final two classes of 2023!

To register for a Schoolhouse class, BBQ members can mail a \$15 check made out to **BBQ** to Boise Basin Quilters, P.O. Box 4434, Boise, ID 83711. Please note what class you are paying for and include your preferred email address. You may also register at the Schoolhouse table at a guild meeting, or by following online instructions on the BBQ website. Classes are held at Boise Rigging Supply, 6750 W. Victory Rd., Boise.

Crumb Quilts, 9:00-3:00 on Oct. 21st.

Back by popular demand, this class will be taught by past guild president Terri Curry, who describes the class this way: "Crumb Quilting is a way of piecing fabric together to make a block or strip of a desired size. The method is a cross between crazy quilting and improvisational work. It's not difficult, so don't be intimidated! The 'crumb blocks' resulting from your work will be a surprising and very interesting way to use scraps and even small orphan blocks by playing with color. Many quilters use their completed crumb blocks to make a quilt divided by sashing or use them with other neutral tones."

Use your own scraps or scraps supplied by the

instructors. You will leave the class with blocks and new ideas to use in your quilts or projects along with resources to help you.

Big-Stitch Quilting, 9:00-3:00 on Nov. 18th.

Big-stitch quilting uses chunky contrasting threads and large stitches to finish a quilt rapidly by hand while adding a lot of texture and interest. Although this type of quilting has been around for a long time and can be found in antique quilts, it has enjoyed a recent revival in popularity and works especially well with modern quilts. It is a perfect starting point for people who are complete beginners at hand quilting and also works well for people who have quilted by hand for a long time but are starting to have difficulty with tiny hand stitches because of arthritis or problems with their eyesight.

In this class taught by Schoolhouse chair Janice Black, you will have

plenty of time to practice the technique either on your own project or on a small quilt provided by BBQ's *Quilts for Kids* special activities division. See the class description on the BBQ website to make sure you're choosing the right supplies for your project, but basically you'll need a thimble; thread snips; chunky thread (perle cotton size 12 is recommended); a strong, sharp needle with an eye large enough for your selected thread to fit through (see class web description for possible choices); and a quilting hoop. If you're using your own sandwiched quilt project, it needs to be larger than your hoop and should have a polyester or wool batting.

We have been busy sorting through the bins of fabric donations received from our generous BBQ members and what a task that has been!

What we have discovered so far:

- 1. There are quite a number of quilt kits ready for all you piecing lovers out there to take home.
- 2. There is a lot of donated scrap fabric that is not easily usable unless someone loves to create scrap or crumb quilts.
- 3. There are many quilt tops ready to be "sandwiched."
- 4. We are sorely lacking fabric large enough to be used as quilt backing. We have been piecing backings but that is very labor and time intensive.
- 5. Quilt batting is expensive and we don't have a stockpile which hinders the ability to get quilts ready for quilting and binding.
- 6. Many of the quilt tops are geared toward an older target group.

What We Plan to do

- 1. We will slow down on making more quilt kits until we reduce the backlog.
- 2. We will be discarding any donated fabric donations that are less than a fat quarter in size and will share the scraps with BBQ members who are scrap and/or crumb quilters. These scraps will be available for free at our table at each BBQ meeting.
- 3. We will accept donations of fat quarter size or larger only.
- 4. We will concentrate on reducing the back log of quilt tops as we are able to get backing fabric and batting. If you are able to donate backing or batting of usable size we will gladly take it!
- 5. We plan to expand our quilt donations beyond kids to include senior care centers and teen pregnancy programs. This will allow us to use the more adult-looking fabrics that we currently have on hand. If you know of entities who might need donated quilts please let Mary Harker know at mclunarian@gmail.com and we will evaluate the need.
- 6. We are researching options for wholesale purchase of batting and backing fabric.

As a reminder, if you are donating a quilt top and backing please help out the long arm quilters by making sure the backing is 4 inches larger all the way around.

Our team will continue to explore options to streamline the program, reduce storage space and lower costs as we become more familiar with the program. We have seen so many beautiful quilts and would like to show some of them at a future BBQ meeting before we donate them. You all are so talented and creative and we are truly grateful for your generosity and time. THANK YOU!



Celebrating our Ruby Jubilee history!

Enterprising group of women create a legacy of creativity, service, and companionship.

Two people, one, an avid embroidery person, Linda Dixon and Jo Inzer Smith, a quilter who recently moved here from California met at a wonderful stitchery shop in Belgravia in downtown Boise (5th and Main - SW corner). Linda wanted to start a chapter of the Embroiderers Guild of America and Jo wanted to belong to a quilt guild like she belonged to in Southern CA. Jo was already attending national quilt conferences. Linda said, "Jo if you help me start an Embroidery Guild, I will then help you start a quilt guild."

About a year later, in 1979, with IGA underway, I was taking a beginning quilting class from Jacque

Riddlemoser at her home. At the time we did not have a quilt shop in Boise, but very nice locally owned fabric stores. I had recently sold The Window Box, my plant and macrame shop in Meridian, and home and moved to Boise's North End into a 90+ year old house to focus on the gift shop opened a year prior in Old Boise, Mother Hubbards Cupboard. Also, my husband and I had purchased a brass bed which seemed to cry for a quilt. I wanted one, but could I live long enough to complete it? At one of my last classes with Jacque, she announced she was soon attending a gathering of quilt enthusiasts in the Boise Highlands and wondered if anyone in class would like to attend.

GUILD HISTORY CELEBRATING 40 YEARS!

I thought it was so close to where I lived I should attend and Jacque volunteered to pick me up, thus we went.

At that meeting it was determined that a quilt guild would form as a part of Embroiderers of America (EGA), thus avoiding all the paperwork associated with starting a separate organization. We paid our membership fees to EGA and \$7.00 of the \$12.00 went to the National organization. Our quilt group of about 16 met in our homes and became known as **Ouilt Gems.** Jo Inzer Smith and Jacque Riddlemoser were the most knowledgeable quilters and assigned us all to research and present programs at our monthly gatherings on the 3rd Tuesdays. I remember being assigned batting... about which I had no idea there was so much to know and consider. It was all a bit intimidating, especially the idea I would ever make a full sized hand pieced, hand quilted quilt. At that time (late 70's), as quilter's the only thing we used our sewing machines for was to sew the quilt together and add the first step of the binding. Because the walking foot had not yet been invented, even machine sewing the binding was time-consuming. We had to baste it first or it would ripple ... heaven forbid.

I joined the group because, one, they were a fun group of women to spend time with and they were going to make a quilt to raffle, raising money to have a quilt show. I was especially attracted to the

idea of making a raffle quilt. If I could actually see a quilt go together to completion and, then, perhaps I would have the confidence to attack one on my own. As time progressed, I could see, even more than making a quilt, how with a quilt show we could raise awareness in our community to the many values of a quilt, hoping they would then be treasures to be inherited, rather than sold at garage sales. That became important to all of us.



JO INZER SMITH

Jo Inzer at a quilt frame from 1982 ... it was our first quilt (1982) in a full-out frame and the last of many to be finished (2005). When Jo was sick in 2005 with a terminal cancer, Linda Dixon rescued the quilt and made sure it got finished before Jo passed. It was not enough for Jo Inzer. In January of 1981, I was one of a group of 6 women invited to lunch at Jo Inzer's house to discuss ways we might all have quilts finished in time for our first show. We soon added an 8th member! By the time lunch was over, a plan had been hatched to that end. Every two weeks, we made blocks for one of us which got us going on our quilt.

Once the quilt top was ready, we would gather at a home, put it on a frame, return 2-3 more times to make some progress and, within the year, we all had quilts at home to work on both on our own and individually. We made our goal of all having finished quilts for the 1983 quilt show and I had a quilt for the brass bed!

Jo Inzer's young and very active twin boys called us "Mom's Quilters" and it stuck. Our small group has lost and added new members and overall doesn't quilt as much or the same as it once did 40+ years ago. But, as of March, 2023, there are 11 of us meeting once each month on First Thursday, sharing our lives and projects. Over the years our small group has lost and added new members. We don't quilt the same as we did 40+ years ago, but we still meet sharing our lives and projects.

Following the Spring of 1983 EGA/Quilt Gems Quilt show, the quilt group broke away and started Boise Basin Quilters. The first order of business was again, to make a quilt and raffle it off in order to raise funds for a quilt show. Boise Basin Quilters' first quilt show was "Pieces Lives: Quilts 1986".

A big part of our charter was to bring awareness of quilting to the Treasure Valley. We showed quilts in many public places including the Capitol Building and invited nationally known quilters to Boise to teach and lecture and promoted those lectures to the public. We made quilts to commemorate the major events, such as the National Governors Conference when held in Boise. And, we held Ada County documentation days followed by a show in 1990 featuring the many special quilts that were uncovered in the process. Those files are now housed at the Idaho State Historical Society.


